Hartford raises rates for garbage

HARTFORD — Local residents and businesses will see a rise in garbage collection fees on the bills mailed at the end of this month.

The household collection fee changed from \$14 to \$22 for a single-family residence. The fee for a small business that has daily collection went from \$5 to \$10, from \$10 to \$15 for a medium-size business and from \$15 to \$20 for a large business.

The fee was also changed from \$10 to \$15 when the service is cut off and another fee is charged when the service is re-connected.

The recycling program will continue, March said. Residents may call city hall to have a large number of newspapers or magazines collected by city workers or the recycling company.

Suspect says attack on Decatur church followed vision from God

DECATUR — A couple accused with two others of overturning the altar at a Roman Catholic church during Sunday worship acted on a vision from God and the belief the new pope is the anticrist, according to interviews published Tuesday in The Decatur Daily.

In a jailhouse interview with the paper, Adam Joseph Turpin, 27, admitted his actions at the Annunciation of the Lord Catholic Church were in poor judgment.

Decatur police charged Turpin, his 20-year-old wife, Lisa Marie Wagner, 26, and their 20-year-old son, Ethan, with felony criminal mischief, following the overnight at the 11 a.m. service.
